Sermon Notes: Three Processions

In October, 331 BC <u>Alexander the Great</u> marched into Babylon, the capital of the Babylonian empire and one of the largest cities of the ancient world (population was probably 200,000+).

• **Go Deeper:** Read the <u>description</u> of Alexander's entry into Babylon by the Roman historian Quintus Curtius Rufus who based his account on earlier Greek sources.

Contrast Alexander's entry into Babylon with Jesus' procession into Jerusalem as recorded in <u>all</u> four gospels.

• Watch Later: <u>Triumphal Entry and Results</u> (from *The Gospel of John movie at the <u>Jesus Film Project</u>).*

In their book *The Last Week: What the Gospels Really Teach About Jesus's Final Days in Jerusalem*, authors Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan write of another procession in Jerusalem on that spring day in 30 A.D.: the procession of <u>Pontius Pilate</u>, the Roman governor of Idumea, Judea, and Samaria.

• **Go Deeper:** Learn more about the <u>Imperial cult of ancient Rome</u> and the divination of its emperors.

Zechariah 9:9-10 is understood by Matthew and John as a prophecy concerning Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and the nature of his kingship.

Life Response:

The question of Palm Sunday and Good Friday: Will you receive the gift of Jesus's offering of himself – his sacrifice for you and your sins?
